Introduction

The Scientific Program of the conference consists of three different parts :

- A. Review Sessions
- B. Paper Sessions
- C. Planning Session
- A. Reviews of pertinent research on a problem area are written by invited contributors. The aim is to present participants with a general, well-documented overview of the essentials of the problem area, which can act as a framework for paper sessions and discussions during the later parts of the conference. To provide the context of discussion, each review will be introduced by the Discussant in a 45 minute talk, followed by a 30 minute discussion with participants. The reviewwriter may wish to join in this discussion.

 The Discussant will bring to the session his experience and skill to indicate the most fruitful lines of research. He will give his evaluative reactions to the problems mentioned in the review.
- B. In the Paper Sessions recent research of theoretical or experimental character will be presented. There are six sessions. Each speaker will present his views or results in a 20 minute paper. Fifteen minutes discussion time will be available to participants after the presentation of each paper.
- C. One session is organized so as to give participants maximum opportunity for creative interchange with fellow researchers. Time will be spent to prepare Project plans for research, to stimulate cooperative and concentrated research efforts. Participants will enumerate their ongoing or planned research.

Proceedings

Reviews, Discussion papers and Papers will be published in the Proceedings. The Organizing Committee is thinking of publication as a special feature of a journal, or a booklet. Participants are requested to provide two type written copies of their contributions to the Organizing Committee preferably at the time of the Conference, but not later than April 30, 1970.



You may have been wondering what became of the Proceedings of the RCSP, so joyously announced sometime ago, as due for November 1970. Well, here is some more news.

Is everything going to 'pot'? Printers' behavior seems to show it: proofs are late in appearing, and authors' corrections go unheeded. Second printings will have to pass into third printings, etc. We have to ap ologize that some misprints will still show up. In December however, Acta Psychologica, Vol.34, nrs 2/3, in which the Proceedings appear, will be ready. The leading question of this paragraph fortunately, can be refuted: it will be possible, due to some valuable backing by University officials, to sell copies of the Proceedings to participants, for Dfl 20,- or \$ 5.75, postage included. Indeed a low price for 250 'fact-filled, glorious pages'.

You may order directly through me. It was agreed with the North-Holland Publishing Company, that I would handle all <u>participants'</u> orders. All participants have 'preferred treatment' for the low price; more than one copy is possible. For non-participants the Publishing Company will continue distribution - for a higher, as yet not fixed price.

Payment should be by cheque, or money-order, in my name. Dutch participants may pay to Gemeente Giro Z 3259, also on my name, and address.

As soon as payment has been recived, what has been paid for will be sent off.

Finally, some information of another kind. Larry Phillips offered to have the III RCSP at Brunel University, London, on september 7 - 9, 1971. You will receive additional information - but keep those dates free!

To close: I will not be available between December 16, and Dec.28 1970. The first copies of the Proceedings thus can only be sent off in January 1971.

May in the year to come your cogitations and agitations produce the results you (and all of us) look for; 'may your days be fruitful - as your questions and ideas draw you on'.

Intermediate Report.

On June 25 all manuscripts of the Proceedings, except one, could be sent to the North-Holland Publishing Company, editor of Acta Psychologica. This means that we are still on schedule.

Hard work was done to achieve this. Referees took many pains to point out mistakes, weak points or possible extensions. All this resulted in rewritten, and even rerewritten versions within ten weeks after the conference.

With a few exceptions however, authors could not confine themselves to the number of pages allotted to them. This point will be taken up next week with the editor - and might mean another round of rewriting. (Keep your fingers crossed).

Assuming a total of approximately 200-210 printed pages for the Proceedings the editor (verbally) promised to reduce its price from the previously estimated f 35,- down to something between f 15,- and f 20,-. We will try to keep it there, or reduce it even more.

The Proceedings are expected to appear in October-November 1970.

SUBMISSION OF PAPERS FOR THE PAPER SESSIONS.

- 1. Papers may be submitted to the Organizing Committee.

 Twenty minutes are available to read the paper in the Paper Session.
- 2. Only abstracts of papers, not exceeding 400 words, need be submitted. Three type-written copies should reach the Organizing Committee, not later than February 1, 1970. Titles of papers will then be included in the Final Programme. (Titles of abstracts submitted later, may not be included).
- 3. Papers should discuss recent experimental results, applications or theoretical work, as yet unpublished.
- 4. Abstracts of papers will not be pre-circulated.
- 5. On the basis of the abstracts the Organizing Committee will try to group the papers of participants in five or six sessions. Each author will be informed by the Organizing Committee in due course whether his contribution, or a revised version, will fit in one of the sessions.
- 6. Overhead projectors will be available.
- 7. Projection facilities will be available for slides.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

Place.

The Conference will take place in the recently rebuilt University Building, Oudemanhuispoort, Amsterdam.

The building is an old people's home, in use since 1880 by the Municipal University of Amsterdam.

Final Programme.

The Final Programme will be sent to participants in March 1970. See also 'Application for participants'.

Language

The language of the conference will be English. German and / or French may be understandable to many participants, however.

Hotels

A list of hotels with reasonable prices will be sent to participants, together with the Final Programme. No responsibility for hotelreservation will be accepted by the Organizing Committee. Generally any Travel Agency will undertake upon request to book hotelrooms.

Meals

Hotels will usually provide a breakfast. Lunches and dinner will be available in all prize ranges and in all kinds of setting within a five minute's walking distance. (300 metres).

Application for participants.

Prospective participants are invited to inform Gerard de Zeeuw, at the indicated address, by letter of their intentions. Registration should be as early as possible.

Only those registered before February 15, 1970 will receive the reviews, to be sent to participants in March 1970. Those later registered may get their copy in Amsterdam. There will be no registration fee. The Final Programme is scheduled to be ready in March 1970 and will be sent to all registered and prospective participants.

Financial aid.

No money is available to assist participants with travel or lodging expenses.

Proceedings.

Reviews and papers will be published in the Proceedings. The Organizing Committee will try to find a Publisher. In case they do not succeed the Proceedings will be stencilled (dittoed).

Only those papers will be accepted for the Proceedings of which two typewritten copies reached the Organizing Committee before April 30, 1970.

Participation.

Participation is open to all those who work, or have done recent research, on subjective probability or related problems.

SOCIAL EVENTS.

- 1. A Reception Center is planned for Wednesday, April 1, 1970, where participants may arrive to meet friends and to get any help the Organizing Committee is able to provide.

 Details on location will be given in the Final Programme.
- 2. Amsterdam has many attractions for visitors. In a general atmosphere of friendliness contacts are easily made with inhabitants. Its canals, its bars, and different places of entertainment are worth visiting.

Candle-lighted boattrips on the canals, quiet get-togethers to discuss the day's events or some other worthy entertainment for participants will be organized and announced in the Final Programme.

The University Building is located within a 300-metre distance from the main entertainment centre, main Post Office, main Minicipal Buildings and other areas of interest.

Second research Conference on Subjective Probability and Related Problems, Amsterdam 1970.

The aim of the conference is threefold: (1). To discuss theoretical and empirical work conducted by participants; (2) To develop new ideas and viewpoints concerning future research in the area of SP; (3) To convey to participants the findings of recent, as yet unpublished theory and research on SP.

The general outline of the conference is contrived as follows. First, comprehensive reviews of pertinent literature are written and distributed some time ahead of the conference by invited authors. Then the conference itself - planned to take place on three succesive days - is proposed to consist of three programmatically different parts. On day 1, lectures are given by invited speakers in order to present participants with a comprehensive discussion and evaluation of a particular problem area. On day 2, research papers are given by participants, in which they sum up and discuss specific problems they have encountered in their own work. These papers are followed by a critical discussion by participants. Day 3 will be devoted to discussions of general, as yet unsolved problems of empirical and theoretical interest in order to anticipate, and hopefully integrate future research.

Because of the finite length of one working day it is believed most suitable to divide one day into not more than 4 working sessions, each one lasting for about 1½ hrs. This implies the categorization of SP-problems into four main streams. Proposed main topics are (subject to alteration): (1) Probability learning and measurement; the concept of expectancy in psychology.(2) The use use of probabilistic information; processing uncertain evidence; intuitive statistics. (3) Utility and risk as factors co-determining decision-making; utility measurement; individual differences in risk-taking, etc..

(4) Theories and models of decision making with special emphasis on the use of SP in decision-making (eventually: stochastic models for learning, choice, and reaction time).

It is planned to organize sessions and lectures so that participants when inclined to do so, will be able to spend all of their time on one main topic.

At the end of the first conference, held at Hamburg University, Germany, on 10,11, and 12 April 1969, Amsterdam, Holland, was favored as the next conference place. Given the preference of participants to convene during the Easter holiday period, two sets of 3 dates each are proposed: either March 24,25, and 26; or April 2, 3, and 4.

Prospective participants, to which this circular is sent, are kindly requested to give their views, preferences and proposals on the following points: (1) preferred set of dates;(2) preferred categorization of the problem area; (3) proposals of names of review writers and lecturers; (4) whether they intend to participate. (It is thought appropriate to limit the conference's membership to those researchers being at the time somewhere in Europe; there are no funds available)

It will be appreciated if you will take the above points into consideration, and if you will let us know your proposals not later than September 1,1969.

Research Conference on Subjective Probability.

Dear Colleague,

At the "Research Conference on Subjective Probability", held on April 10, 11, 12 1969 at the Psychological Institute of the University of Hamburg, it was decided that the conference did fulfill a useful role. The participants not only got to know each others recent work, but also could discuss informally future research plans and (subjective) problems there with. In these discussions differences in interpretation of several important concepts were made explicit or even removed. In this way fruitful openings for future research were established.

The participants of the conference decided that such a conference should be held regularly; the majority supported a periodicity of one year. The next conference will be in the spring of 1970. Topics should include subjective probability problems, and might include anything that fits into the decision-theoretical paradigm.

Miss H.C. van der Meer and the undersigned agreed to organize the conference in Amsterdam. Details like place and date etc, will be sent somewhere in the autumn or the end of 1969.

The purpose of this letter is to draw your attention to it - and to ask for names and addresses of anyone you think would be interested in attending. At the last conference it was suggested that a strong link with mathematical statisticians, or people of related disciplines would be advisable (of course barring a majority of them!).

This letter then is to ask for information and to establish an address for correspondence. Any suggestion about people, topios or organization will be highly appreciated.
